Careless/untrained insiders are noted as the largest source of security threats at federal agencies. This increased from 42% in 2014.

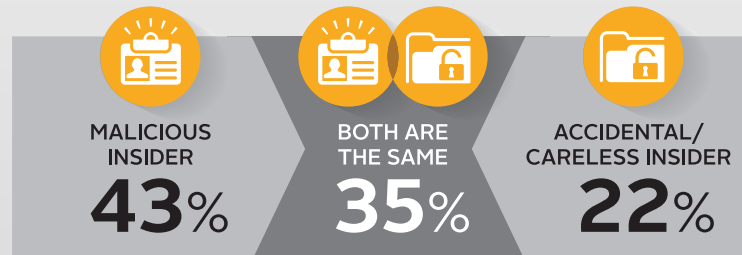


SOURCE OF DAMAGING BREACHES

MOST DAMAGING BREACHES

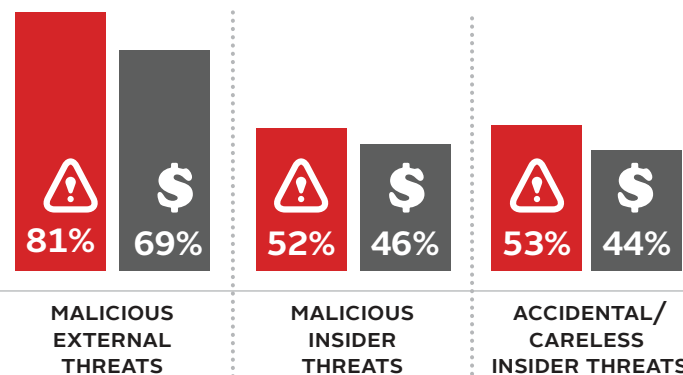


MOST DAMAGING **INSIDER** BREACHES



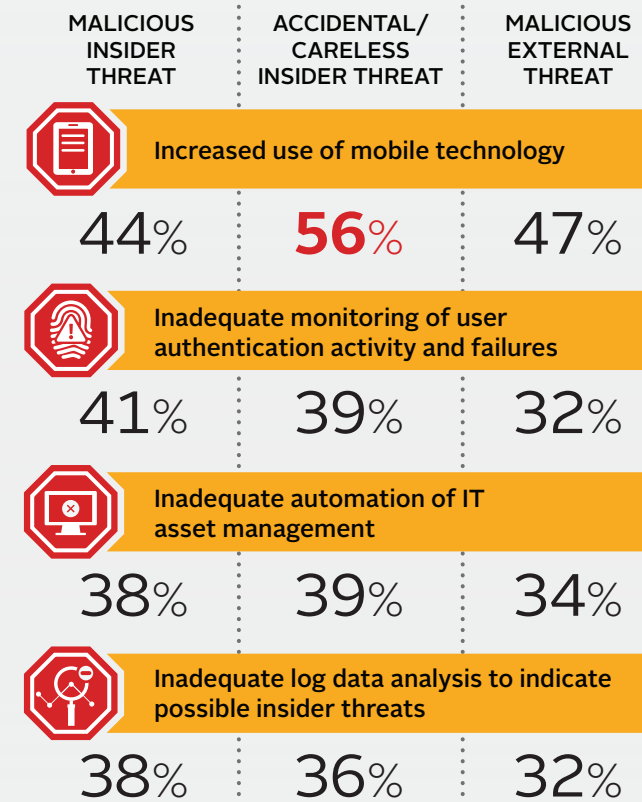
While concern about internal and external threats has increased, investment in resources has lagged.

TOP OBSTACLES TO THREAT PREVENTION

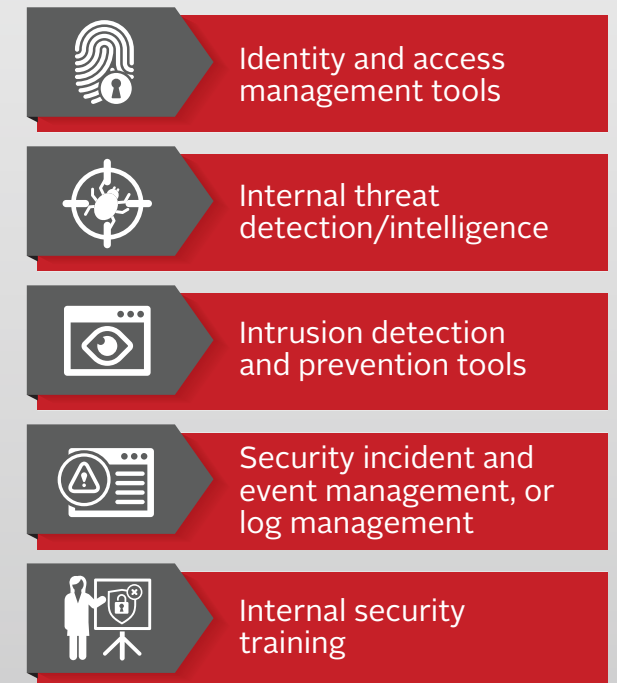
Four obstacles to preventing threats rise to the top, whether threats are insider or external, malicious or accidental.



46% say **insufficient security training** for government employees or contractors is seen as a top obstacle to preventing **accidental/careless insider** threats.
